### Kankakee Sands Bison: Herd Update

Bison typically give birth in the late spring, but this year held a surprise for our herd. Not only were two bison calves unexpectedly born in August, another calf was born in October! Twenty-seven calves were born this year into our Kankakee Sands bison herd, bringing our total to 116 animals. Calves not only grow our herd, but also give us the opportunity to share animals above our pasture-carrying capacity.

Bison are a keystone species of our North American prairies, sustaining thousands of natural relationships that ensure ecological and cultural resiliency. In the 1800s, these vital relationships were severed by U.S. government policies intended to harm and control Native Peoples through the eradication of the bison. The loss of bison still reverberates across the land and within communities today. This history is richly retold in the recently released 4-hour PBS documentary, *The American Buffalo*, by Ken Burns. TNC is working in partnership with the InterTribal Buffalo Council, Tanka Fund and Native Nations to return bison to tribal lands.

The InterTribal Buffalo Council, Tanka Fund and Native Nations are leaders in buffalo restoration. We are humbled and honored to work in partnership with them. ## Bioblitz Update

On June 3, 2023, the Indiana Academy of Science (IAS) and Kankakee Sands partnered to host a Bioblitz—a 24-hour period in which scientists from all around the state visit one site to inventory as many living creatures as possible. What a day it was! Glené Mynhardt, the IAS Bioblitz organizer, has been accumulating the data from the many different taxa teams. To date, a total of 759 different species were noted during the time period. Highlights include:

- The Bird Team documented 89 species, including several endangered species: trumpeter swan, king rail, northern harrier, barn owl, sedge and marsh wrens, and Henslow's sparrow. Also noted were multiple species of special concern: northern bobwhite quail, eastern whip-poor-will, sandhill crane, American woodcock, and grasshopper sparrow.
- The Snail-killing Flies Team found 8 species, 5 of which are new Newton County records. Worldwide, 551 species of snail-killing flies have been documented. North America has 170 species, and Indiana has 61. We were lucky to have Bill Murphy, a snail-killing fly expert, at this year's BioBlitz!
- The Fungi Team identified 27 species, one of which, in the genus *Inocybe*, was found in the bison pasture and seems to represent the first of its kind in Indiana based primarily on DNA sequence similarity.
- The Lepidoptera Team documented 16 butterfly species and 426 moth species, six of which are rare, threatened or endangered. Fifty-five new moth species were recorded, bringing Kankakee Sands' moth total to 1,330 species!

## Landscaping improvements at the Kankakee Sands Nursery

The Kankakee Sands Nursery is a hub of volunteer and outreach activities. In 2023 alone, we led more than a dozen greenhouse, seed harvesting and seed processing workdays. We also had school groups visit, led tour groups, and hosted evening mothing events and daytime monarch tagging events. The nursery is a welcoming, safe and beautiful place to spend time in nature.

This year, volunteers Marc and Barb Meijer offered their experience and expertise to work in partnership with Friends of the Sands and TNC to revamp the nursery landscaping with 65+ plant species native to Newton County and install an ADA accessible walkway and an informational kiosk. Great strides have taken place this year—the walkway was laid, informational kiosk installed, and seed acquired for the plants that will be grown next spring. Thank you to Marc and Barb for leading this project!

This project is just one of several to be implemented next year as part of our Kankakee Sands Visitor Improvements effort. At the Kankakee Sands Nursery, a picnic pavilion and signage will be installed. At the Kankakee Sands Headquarters and the Bison Viewing area, welcome pavilions and bison viewing platforms will be constructed. There will be parking area improvements at all three locations as well.

TNC is seeking qualified contractors to construct these facilities. In January 2024, we will advertise for the construction phase of this project.
